Directions: Take Broadway to the Rondout. Left onto East Strand, approximately ¼ mile to the “Working on Water” Event, look for signs on the south side of the street. Park along the adjacent local streets.

Barge No. 79 was built by the Lehigh Valley Railroad in 1914 and is the last of this type of covered wooden barge still afloat in this country. It is on the National Register of Historic Places and is home to the traveling Waterfront Museum, Home-ported in Red Hook, Brooklyn.
